



TO DRILL A RIVET

I looked in dismay at the rivets I had just installed. No way to get the next row in with them in place!! Try a different tool?...come in from the back side?...leave the next row out?... No...it sank into my thought...I had made a mistake...

Reminds me of early on when I sat in Jamie Stutterheim's office Rans. (She does orders at Rans Aircraft) She was telling me to expect to make some mistakes. I am of a mind set that dislikes making mistakes. Our teachers in school expected us to make 100% on our papers! I think it affected my personality.

When a mistake is made 3 things need to happen:

- 1. Realize, own, admit... that a mistake has been made.
- 2. Forgive yourself and others; accept it... you will have to forgive so you can move forward.
- 3. Seek for a remedy, a fix, a healing... work at doing just that.

These 3 steps are going to work in lots of life's issues. Would you or I have a harmful relationship (physical or emotional) that has a history of mistakes?? Could we apply these 3 rules?? Would it help??

Now, dear reader, if our people, our nation, our communities, our families, ourselves would apply these 3 simple rules, would our political and spiritual climates be way better off??!!

So after I had went through the above 3 steps, I decided I would drill the 3 rivets out. Brian Shirley had told me just how to punch out what is left of the mandrel. (That's the stem that goes POP! on a pop rivet. As a young boy, it intrigued me! It actually breaks apart and a piece stays in there.) Then get the correct drill bit and do it..."Simple," he said.

So I drilled them...Do the correct sequence for putting the rivets in... Rans Aircraft sends the correct amount of rivets for the amount of holes drilled in the framework of the vertical stabilizer. So I am 3 rivets short!

Hello, Janelle (Rans parts) this is Jerry. I need 3 AAPQ-46 rivets...."yeah," she says, "let me look...yeah I have them...that will be \$2.55 + \$6.00 shipping...I'll need a payment of \$8.55." I listen, gulp, gulp...my Aircraft Owner Thrifty (AOT) kicked in. "Janelle, I'm going to think about it a little."

3 rivets for \$8.55!! That's outrageous!! (You notice how guys who own airplanes don't have any money?!) I'll call Crott's at Dodge. They might possibly have those rivets.

Helo, Mike Webber, this is Jerry... I need 3 rivets. "Yeah," he says, "we have a bunch in a big tote leftover from building our S21. You can pick up the tote and look through there."

So I hop in my ½ ton Chevy and do the 40 miles to Dodge City. (Pickup makes around 18 mpg. Gas is \$3.29 per gallon. Go figure!) Cruise back home, unload the tote. Every rivet in there except the AAPQ-46! None of those!

□ O dear!

Hello Rans...yeah Janelle...I'd be glad if you could send me the rivets! I'll send you the money. Thank you much! with a measure of humility in my voice! So a day or two later, rivets in hand I complete the frame of the vertical stabilizer! Whew!! That was easy?? What did we learn here?

Start with admitting, apply forgiveness, add open your checkbook, and out of a TRUE heart come up with a big dose of humility

In closing... To Drill A Rivet

Just do it! (as Brian Shirley says, "it's easy!") Replace it with the correct ones and a good dose of humility.

The end result will be a correctly constructed airworthy aircraft!

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KYMBERLY LOGAN KEEPS THEM FLYING



In April I had the opportunity to become part of living history in more ways than one. Dad and I went to Stillwater, Oklahoma for a fly in with the CAF Cimmaron Strip Wing's C-45 which are both members.

I also went to Oshkosh for training to become a Tour Aircraft Maintenance Officer, aka TAMO, for the EAA's B-25 "Berlin Express". I will fly with the B-25 for two 2 week stints this summer to maintain it while it is out on tour.

Oshkosh sure does look different without thousands of aircraft and people all over and of course with some snow!

Both aircraft are currently selling tickets to the public for an experience to fly in a WWII aircraft. All proceeds go to local chapters as a fund raiser and to assist in aircraft support.

Both aircraft require a lot of maintenance to keep flying and each one has certain aspects that need attention. As with most warbirds built during WWII, they were designed to fly for a few hours/bombing raids and then expected to be basically scrapped due to dam-



age. However, in some cases, it never saw combat and therefore was either sold to a scrap yard or someone else. And in other cases, the combat damage was minimal and was then sold to scrap or someone else.

Below is a picture that came across my LinkedIn page that is a transcribed version of the prices of surplus aircraft in 1946. If only I could go back in time!! Remember, the average yearly income during that time was only \$3,000.00. But if you're curious about today's cost, multiply the 1946 cost by 15.48.

I have seen firsthand the look on everyone's face when they get to board the aircraft and when they come back. It's the same feeling I get each time I hear those big radial engines purr! Everyone smiles from ear to ear like a 2-year-old on Christmas morning!

We get to enjoy these moments today because of men and women who produced, maintained, and flew these aircraft during one of the most memorable and difficult times in our nation's history. During that time, it wasn't a "being too difficult to do" mindset, it was a mindset of "what can I do to do my part". Many Americans stepped up to the challenge and we owe them more than our gratitude.



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

MId-America Air Museum By Bob Immell, Director



B-25 MITCHELL



This month's featured airplane is once again the North American B-25 Mitchell medium bomber from WWII. This is "Part 2" of a two-part article. Last month's article focused mostly on the history of the airplane type, whereas this month's article focuses more on the history of the exact plane in our museum and reported flight characteristics. To say that our airplane has done a lot of traveling and gone through a lot of modifications is probably not an exaggeration.

The plane was built in Kansas City and was originally classified as a B-25J with the strafer nose. In January 1945 it was delivered to Hunter Army Airforce Base in Georgia and in February was given an overseas assignment via Morrison AAF in Florida. From this point until it returned to the United States we have little to no information about it. It appears that in July 1945 the plane returned to Hunter AAF on its way to the 4138th Air Material Command at Lauren AAF to be put into storage. In April 1946 it went to the 4168 AAF Base in South Plains, Texas for storage. In July 1947 it went to the 414st AF Base in Pyote, Texas again for storage. In January 1952 it remained in Pyote, Texas but the Air Force Unit changed to the 2753rd. In January 1953 the plane was moved to Maxwell Air Force Base in Alabama where it was deployed to Fairfax Field in Kansas City and then to Memphis Tennessee. In August 1954 it was transferred to the 32nd Air Defense Command in Syracuse, New York. In October 1954 it was transferred back the Maxwell Air Force Base. In 1956 it was sent to Hayes Aircraft in Birmingham, Alabama where it was converted into a TB-25N. In July 1956 it was sent back to Maxwell, then in November of that year was transferred to the 78th Fighter Group at Hamilton Air Force Base in California. Two months later it went back to Maxwell and on April 1, 1957 the armament and the auxiliary fuel tank located in the bomb bay was removed. It resided there until April 1958 when it was transferred to the 2704th at Davis-Monthan in Arizona. In December 1959 it was declared surplus property.

When the plane started its 2nd life as a civilian owned airplane our records get a little sketchy, but it was used as a fire bomber for a time and as a crop duster from 1960 to 1963 according to our log books. Colonel Thomas acquired the plane in February 1984. The airplane was supposed to come to Liberal and perform at the 1988 airshow according to our records, but cracked a cylinder close to Woodward, Oklahoma where it landed and remained until it was repaired. The plane arrived in Liberal on December 3, 1988. Interesting enough even before I started my research for this article about a year and a half ago my Restoration Technician Rod Horner and I were inside the plane cleaning it and we were surprised to find evidence of its previous life as a spray plane which was a total shock to us. We knew that Avengers were used for a while as spray planes including one operator here many years ago, but never thought about B-25s being used as spray planes, borate fire bombers perhaps, but not crop dusters. In the planes present condition, it weighs 21,120 pounds as per our records. We have some conflicting records, but it appears that the original Wright Cyclone R-2600-29A left engine was replaced with a Wright R-2600-35 engine in 1964 and the right engine was replaced with a R-2600-35 engine in 1981. The airframe had a total time of 3689.8 hours as of June 1982 and 3855.9 hours as of May 18, 1988. In 1988 the elevator, left and right rudders and ailerons were recovered with fabric.

In addition to the B-25 here, we actually have an engine from another B-25 that is on loan from the Marine Corp. It has been in a crate that was in storage in the old B-24 hangar just North of the museum for a couple of decades and when we brought it into the museum about a year and a half ago the crate was



disintegrating as we moved it and by the time we got it inside there was virtually nothing left of the crate except part of the bottom, but the engine and the stand were intact. The Marine Corp thought they had loaned us an R-2800 engine, but it actually turned out to be the left R-2600-29A engine from a B-25. We are also the proud owners of a lifting eye for the R-2600 and we also have a lifting eye for an R-2800 engine.

It is time now to talk about the general flight characteristics and specs for B-25. The length of the plane is 67 feet 7 inches, and has a wingspan of 53 feet 6 inches, and a height of 16 feet 4 inches. The airplane had a ground roll takeoff distance of 3,000 feet and a landing distance of 2,000. Each engine has a front and rear tank for a total of 335 gallons in the wings, with an auxiliary tank holding 152 gallons in each outboard wing. A 585-gallon droppable auxiliary tank could be carried in the bomb bay. The oil take for each engine was 37.5 gallons. Take off speed was between 110 and 120 miles per hour with a landing speed of 100 miles per hour. A maximum level flight speed at 20,000 feet of 240 miles per hour, and a normal cruise speed of 185 miles per hour. The minimum controllable airspeed was reported to be 145 miles per hour. Bombing runs were normally made at 200 miles per hour and from 200 feet in the Pacific War. In addition to generally being considered the easiest of US bombers to fly it was also considered to be the noisiest in the cockpit of all of our bombers. That is primarily due to the closeness of the engines to the cockpit.

Only about 800 solid nose B-25 were built and of course ours was one of those. Normally this configuration had a crew of 6 men consisting of the Pilot, Co-Pilot, Bombardier/Navigator, Flight Engineer/Upper Turret Gunner, Radio Operator/Waist Gunner, and a Tail Gunner. It normally carried 200-pound bombs, but was capable of carrying bombs ranging from 100 pound to 2,000 pounds, or one torpedo. There are 8 fixed 50 caliber machine guns in the nose. Two 50 caliber guns in the turret, one 50 caliber gun at each waist position, and two 50 caliber guns in the tail gunner position.

As always if you wish to see the plane in person just come on by. Be sure to say hello to the Co-Pilot Capt. Bones while you are here.



SPORTY'S IPAD PILOT NEWS

PREVENT IPAD OVERHEATING ISSUES IN THE AIRPLANE THIS SUMMER

Based on iPad Pilot News reader surveys over the years, the majority of pilots have had the iPad shut down on them at least once in flight due to overheating. This is by far the most common problem reported by pilots when flying with an iPad, but it can be prevented with a little bit of planning and preparation.

Apple lists the normal temperature operating range for the iPad as $32^{\circ}-95^{\circ}$ F. The recommended temperature for storing your iPad is $-4^{\circ}-113^{\circ}$ F. While there are reports of the iPad shutting down when operating in environments well below freezing, the most likely result will be lagging as you interact with the touchscreen (tip – when operating in cold environments, plug it into a charger and use a case to help generate and retain heat).

The more likely scenario when operating at the extreme ends of the temperature operating range is overheating, which will lead to the iPad entering a thermal protection mode where it will become completely unusable until the internal temperature of the device is reduced. The primary reason for this is to protect the enclosed lithium-polymer battery (bad things can happen if they get too hot).

There are a couple of ways on a typical flight that this can happen and both will catch you off guard if you're not paying attention. The first scenario can happen when you're flying in a low-wing airplane en route at altitude with the iPad secured in a kneeboard on your lap. You're in VFR conditions in sunny weather, but the iPad is out of direct sunlight.

Then you make a turn over a waypoint, and the sun begins to shine directly on your iPad's dark screen without you noticing. Even though the ambient temperature may be well below the 95° F limit, the iPad's internal temperature will quickly elevate and soon display the overheat warning.

The other likely scenario in which your iPad can unexpectedly overheat is after shutting the engine down on the ramp on a hot summer day. Prior to the iPad, many pilots would set their paper charts or kneeboard on the glare shield to get them out of the way. New iPad users might inadvertently do the same thing out of habit.

As we all know, the temperature inside the cabin will quickly rise after you shut the door...
